Hurricane season begins June 1, so all of us in Wiggins must do the best we can to be prepared and protect ourselves, our neighbors, and our property.

Experts at Colorado State University expect the season to be busy and expect the formations of 23 named storms and 11 hurricanes. In Florida, the Atlantic hurricane season starts on June 1st and lasts until November 30th. While hurricanes can happen at any time, peak season is generally between August and October

While there are a number of well-known and reliable sites that contain multitudes of information, on the following page we have added some federal, state and local sites that may be helpful. It is so important to know that if a hurricane strikes the area, internet access may be unreliable or unavailable. Take a moment to review and store/print information that you think may be helpful prior to the storm.

Whether you are a full or part-time resident, you will need to ensure that your lanai is clear of furniture, flower pots and other items that can potentially cause damage during a storm. All outside items, i.e., welcome mats and decorative door hangings, should be removed as they can be blown away and cause damage.

What else?



- Confirm your contact details are up to date on the WLP website and sign up for email blasts
- If you have them, lower storm shades.
- Close and lock all windows and doors.
- Secure outdoor storage spaces. Bring in any items that can blow around and cause damage.
- Move vehicles further inland.
- Monitor weather status.
- Move valuable items off of the floors.
- Confirm you have numbers at the ready such as neighbors, home watch and insurance companies.
- Check on your neighbors

Landscaping Update from Lynn Radicello and Don Rodner

April was a celebratory month as privacy hedging, bushes and grasses to “hide” mechanicals including the front air conditioning units on the long or lake buildings, and 42 trees were planted throughout the community. These accomplishments were the first three priority areas to address. Thank you to the Board of Directors for supporting this endeavor and thank you to all the community members who cheered on the Blue Landscaping Planting crews. The crews appreciated all the acknowledgement and encouragement they received! Recent pictures show the new plantings are thriving with new leaves and buds as the trees especially recover from the stress of transporting and planting.

Before all the trees were even in, we were meeting with Blue Landscaping Designer to begin work on phase 4. Phase 4 involves addressing the fronts of buildings. As you have likely noted, some buildings will require a great deal of replacement vegetation while other buildings may just require filling in some holes. It is anticipated that initial designs will be received and reviewed this summer. Funding for this phase is not accounted for within the current budget and progress is dependent on rain and irrigation expense savings. Phase 5 is planned to address the sides and backs of buildings.

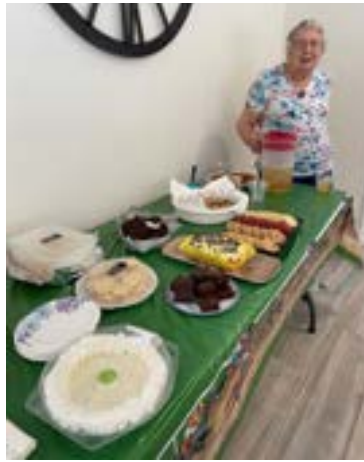

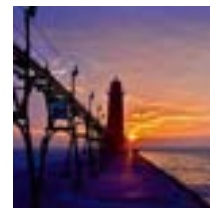

We are taking a pause on our “Original Owners” Spotlights to highlight some of our Snowbirds. We know they leave, but where in the world do they go? They migrate north, but where do they land? If you ask some of them and they hold up their right hand with the palm showing and shaped like a mitten, then watch them point with their left index finger to where they live, you can bet it is Michigan!



Mitzi and George

We'll start this series with Mitzi and George Fazzola, and Susan and Roger Jonas. They will point to a spot just below their little pinkie right on the edge of their palm and explain it is the Lake Michigan side. Then you will get a tutorial on how big the lake is. "You cannot see across it. It is eighty miles wide. Milwaukee is on the other side. It is 400 miles long. (For perspective, that would be from the southern tip of Florida to the Georgia state line and half the width of Florida.) And it is the second largest Great Lake behind Lake Superior. And by the way, 20% of the world's fresh water is in the Great Lakes. And Michigan has the second longest coastline only behind Alaska."



Roger and Susan

We live in an area known as Grand Haven, Spring Lake and Ferrysburg with a population of 32,000. This is where the Grand River, Michigan's longest, meets Spring Lake, which empties into Lake Michigan.



Grand Haven was settled in the 1830's as a fur trading post and later as a lumber and sawmill port. Eventually, lumber was shipped by boat to Chicago when they had to rebuild after the Chicago Fire. As a major port, passenger ships would bring visitors to the mineral springs that were here. Many resorts were established and cottages were built to take advantage to all the natural beauty of the area.



Needless to say water is the attraction here. And boating - hundreds of watercraft in the private docks and the large marinas. Fishing is popular in our lakes, streams and the Big Lake where you can charter a boat or take your own to catch salmon and lake trout.

But we are defined by our parks, our sand dunes and our beaches - second to none! Perfect for climbing, picnicking, swimming, and just plain lounging in the sand. And we have great schools!

Lake Michigan is also where we get our drinking water. All of the coastal communities get their water from the Great Lakes and also some larger inland cities like Grand Rapids. No salt, no sharks, no jellyfish, no red tide.

Our spring, summer and fall seasons are filled with festivals and attractions that appeal not only to the locals but to visitors and tourists alike. Tourism is big part of our local economy along with manufacturing and agriculture; blueberry fields are bountiful.

Mitzi and Sue call this area their hometown. George is from Detroit and Roger grew up on a small farm near Grand Ledge in the center of the state. We all call this area 'Grand Heaven'.

Reminder about ARC forms: There are very clear rules about making changes to your unit. Any modifications to the exterior of your unit (for example, AC line sets, or changing windows), and certain interior modifications (for example, installing new flooring with appropriate soundproofing) require approval of the Board by submission of the ARC form. Please be sure to complete this **before** the work begins. Being a “Good Neighbor” does mean being respectful of the condo rules and regulations.

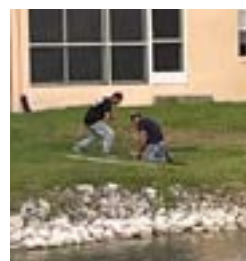

Our Wiggins Gator... CAPTURED!

According to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservations Commission, over 1.3 million alligators live in the Sunshine State. They are a fundamental part of Florida’ wetlands, swamps, rivers, and lakes. Florida has created a Nuisance Alligator Program. Despite what we all think, an alligator is deemed to be a nuisance if it is at least four feet in length and poses a threat to people, pets, or property. May and June are alligator mating season, so perhaps our gator was looking for love in Wiggins. Hopefully he did not find it and was totally alone!



FWC sent a team of Nuisance Trappers, and they did the job. Because he was a young gator, he will be relocated to a farm in LaBelle. We hope he is much happier there than in Wiggins. And more importantly, we hope he had no family and friends here!
